
A View Through My Window


2023 President's Challenge Finished Size: 18"x30"

Pattern Notes:

All pieces listed below are unfinished. Use a ¼" seam allowance.

Fabric: Kona Jet Black #114





Cutting Instructions:

While supplies last, the guild is providing a 5" piece of 60" wide Kona Jet Black. (These instructions are based on a 60" WOF)

From the 5" piece provided, subcut into $2 - 2 \frac{1}{2}$ " strips.

Subcut 1 of the 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ " strips into $2-26\frac{1}{2}$ " strips (Piece B)

Subcut 1 of the 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ " strips into $2 - 18 \frac{1}{2}$ " strip (Piece A) be sure to leave a strip

that will yield one piece to be 14 1/2" long

1 - 14 ½" strip

Trim the 14 ½" x 2 ½" strip to 14 ½" x 1 ½" (Piece D - for center sashing of widow)

The 2 inside sections of the window (the top and bottom of the window) will equal 14 % W x 13" H (Piece C).

Assembly:

- 1. After completing Pieces C (the top and bottom of the view in/out of your window), connect/join them by sewing Piece D between them. Press seam allowances towards the black fabric.
- 2. Add Pieces B (1 to each of the right and left sides) as a Left and Right Border/window frame. Press seam allowances towards the black fabric.
- 3. Add Pieces A (1 to the top and 1 to the bottom) as the top and bottom border/window frame. Press seam allowances towards the black fabric.
- 4. Finish the quilt either by binding the quilt with Kona Jet Black Fabric or by facing the quilt. The quilt must also have a sleeve and label following the specifications set by the 2023 Quilt Show Rules. (NOTE: For display purposes, the Kona Jet Black fabric must be the final element at all outside edges of the quilt.)

A View Through My Window – President's Challenge 2023

"A short story is what you see when you look out of the window." -Mavis Gallant

This year, I challenge our quilt guild members to create a window scene either looking in or out of a window. All the windows will have the same frame and measure 18"x30". A piece of Kona Jet Black fabric, which was donated by Bernina World of Sewing, will be provided as well as a pattern for the window frame. All styles of quilting are welcomed, and the goal is to hang them at the 2023 Capital Quilters Guild Quilt Show as if you are looking into or out of an apartment building. Please join me in creating what is sure to be a beautiful installation.

The Rules....

- 1. The finished quilt must measure 18" wide by 30" long.
- 2. While supplies last, each member will be provided a piece of Kona Jet Black fabric which should be used as the window frame. Additional Kona Jet Black fabric can be purchased at your local quilt shop for windowpane dividers/mullions/grilles/muntins.
- 3. The quilt must be finished with a binding which should be the same fabric as the window frame (Kona Jet Black) or by finishing your edges by adding facing to the quilt (ie. using a pillowcase method.) Please note that to be eligible for judging, quilting must be seen on the back of the quilt. Additional fabric for the binding can be purchased at your local quilt shop.
- 4. All quilts must satisfy all requirements as set forth by the 2023 Quilt Show Rules and must have a sleeve following those specifications.
- 5. Quilts will be due by the 2023 Capital Quilters Quilt Show Entry Deadline. Exact due dates will be published once the quilt show committee announces them. Please know that having your project judged is OPTIONAL. Please feel free participate within the category as a non-judged quilt. However, all non-judged quilts must be registered by the quilt show entry deadline and submitted by preview day.
- 6. Participation is for 2022-2023 Capital Quilt Guild Members only.

Spring Workshops

Kelly Ashton, April 21 & 22 - \$55 members and \$75 non-members

As a self-described "pragmatic quilt-maker", Kelly Ashton approaches quilt design and construction with a knowledge of and appreciation for the theoretical while searching for and developing skills and short-cuts that are practical. Kelly's passion for patchwork covers a dichotomy between "microwave quilts" (quilts that are simple in design and quick to piece) to "crock-pot quilts" (quilts that are more intricate and complex in their construction), and she happily moves back and forth betwixt the two.....and everything in-between! Kelly is the author of Hexagons, Diamonds, Triangles, and More: Skill-Building Techniques for 60-



Degree Patchwork, and her obsession with 60-degree patchwork continues. In addition to designing quilts, Kelly especially loves to teach and talk about quilts. Her motto is "Have quilts. Will travel."

Kelly is a Bernina Ambassador and some of her classes can also be found on the Craftsy website (https://www.craftsy.com). Kelly resides in Overland Park, KS, USA with her husband, Jeff Seib. 





Jane Hall





















Membership



New Jersey State Block

Notes:

The block is 12 1/2 inches square unfinished.

This is a modified log cabin, courthouse steps pattern. The strips are added across from each other. Each set of four strips that forms a square is a different width.

Center each strip on the previous strip. Strips H/I, B/C, J/K, D/E and L/M are cut slightly longer than needed, so be sure to trim them after each pair of strips is added.

Press all seams toward the outer strip.

The block will be trimmed to a 12 ½ inch square after all strips are added. After the L and M strips are added, the remaining strip lengths are shorter than the square unit, and will be centered on the previous strip and trimmed off when the block is squared.

Use the guide to the right for adding strips to the middle square (A). Use a scant $\frac{1}{2}$ inch seam.



Step 1: Start with square A and the two H pieces. Sew the H pieces to opposite sides of A. Press seams toward the H pieces. Trim to 1 ½ x 4 as needed. Next center the two I pieces to the other sides of the A/H unit, and sew. Press seams toward the I pieces. Trim to 4 x 4 as needed. See photo 1.

Step 2: Attach the two B pieces to the opposite sides of the Step 1 unit that have the seams (always add the new color strips to the sides with the seams first). Stitch and press seams toward the B pieces. Trim the ends flush with the step 1 unit. Next add the C pieces on the remaining sides of the Step 1 unit. Stitch, press toward the C pieces, and trim to a 5 ½ inch square as needed. See photo 2.

Step 3: Attach the J pieces to the two opposite sides of the step 2 unit that have the seams. Stitch, press toward the J pieces and trim the ends of the J pieces flush with the unit. Attach the two K pieces to the opposite sides of the unit. Stitch, press toward the K pieces. Trim the unit to 7 ½ inches as needed. See photo 3.

Step 4: Attach the D pieces to the step 3 unit, on the opposite sides with the seams. Stitch, press toward the D pieces and trim the ends of the D pieces flush with the unit. Attach the two E pieces to the opposite sides of the unit. Stitch, press toward the E pieces. Trim the unit to 8 ¾ as needed. See photo 4.

Step 5: Attach the L pieces to the step 4 unit, on the opposite sides with the seams. Stitch, press toward the L pieces and trim the ends of the L pieces flush with the unit. Attach the two M pieces to the remaining sides of the step 4 unit. Stitch, press toward the M pieces. Trim the unit to 10 ½ inches if needed. See photo 5.

*From this point, the strips that are added will be shorter than the pieces they are attached to – the ends of these strips are outside of the 12 ½ inch square that the block will be trimmed to after all strips are added.












New Jersey State Block

Cutting Requirements:

Fabric 1: Blue (There is not a lot of extra fabric; start with the bottom, F strips and work your way up according to the diagram.)


- A. One 1 ½ inch square
- B. Two 1 ¼ x 4 ½ inch strips
- C. Two 1 ¼ x 5 ¾ inch strips
- D. Two 1 1/8 x 8 inch strips
- E. Two 1 1/8 x 9 ¼ inch strips
- F. Four 1 ¼ x 10 ½ inch strips
- G. Four 2 x 4 inch strips





Fabric 2: Cream (There is not a lot of extra fabric; start with the bottom, M strips and work your way up according to the diagram. After the M strip is cut off, cut a 4 ½ inch strip. Then cut the 2 I, 2 H, 4 N and 2 K pieces. Note that the K pieces are slightly longer than the N pieces.)

- H. Two 1 ¾ x 1 ¾ squares
- I. Two 1 ¾ x 4 ½ inch strips
- J. Two 1 ½ x 5 ¾ inch strips
- K. Two 1 ½ x 7 ¾ inch strips
- L. Two 1 3/8 x 9 inch strips
- M. Two 1 3/8 x 10 ¾ inch strips
- N. Four 1 ½ x 7 ½ inch strips



New Jersey State Block

Step 6: Attach the F pieces to each of the sides of the step 5 square unit. They will overlap by ¼ inch, but this will be trimmed off after all the strips are added. Press the seams toward the F pieces. Trim to 13 inches as needed. See photo 6.

Step 7: The four N pieces are centered on the F pieces, right sides together, as shown in photo 7a. Stitch, press seams toward the N pieces. Trim the unit to 15 inches as needed. See photo 7b.

Step 8: The four G pieces are each centered on one of the N pieces from Step 8, right sides together. Stitch, press seams toward the G pieces. See photo 8.









Complete block

Line up the block on your cutting matt, with all corners lined up with the horizontal and vertical lines on your mat, as shown in photo 9. Then trim each side *6 and ½* inches from the midline, as shown in photo 10, which will yield a 12 ½ inch block.





2022 Holiday Blocks

We will be selling Holiday Blocks at the October guild meeting. Eleven groups and/ or individuals will be providing blocks for our guild members to choose.

Kits will sell for \$2 each, and we kindly request you bring \$1 bills since change will not be readily available. (Hint: Those with exact change will have the opportunity to purchase blocks first at the designated tie during the meeting.)

Blocks will be available to preview beginning at 6:30, and sale of the blocks will take place at a designated time during the meeting. Please do not attempt to purchase block kits before the announced time at the meeting. Only one block may be purchased initially. If there are any remain blocks available, those may be purchased after all have had a chance to purchase their first block.

If you buy a kit, you must complete the block and turn it in at either the November or the December meeting. Representatives of the groups/individuals providing kits will have someone available to collect the completed blocks at each meeting.

Winners will be drawn from those who turn in a completed block by the December meeting. There will be approximately 16 winners. If a member is unable to complete their block, please return the unfinished block so it can be given to that block's winner.

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One Quilter's Experience

<u>Disclaimer:</u> I do not hold myself out as an expert. I know that many of you know so much more than I do. I share my experience in the hope of helping newer quilters as well as to stimulate conversation among more experienced quilters. I welcome feedback and differing views, as we are all on this journey together and can only benefit from hearing each other. (If you are reading this in the newsletter, please weigh in on Facebook.)

Quilt as desired

(aka, the three least helpful words found in instructions)

Anyone who has ever looked at a quilt pattern (i.e., all of us) knows that once that lovely top has been pieced, the pattern designer usually ends with the profoundly unhelpful phrase "quilt as desired". Well, duh! I also tend to "piece as desired". Don't ever wait for someone to give you permission to do whatever the heck you want with your quilts.

To their credit, some publications show you how their sample was quilted. Additionally, some will even show you a sketch of an alternate quilting design. While it is helpful to know how other quilters decided to quilt a particular design, never forget that these are only suggestions and that any number of other options would enhance the beauty of your quilt. If you are looking for an all-over design and are willing to pay a long-armer to quilt it for you, then they will have one or more huge notebooks of quilt designs from which to choose.

However, here is my two-cents' worth — make your own choices and do your own quilting. All-over or custom, dense or loose, fancy or simple — make your quilt thoroughly your own. Use a stencil, mark where you want to go, free-hand it, use rulers or some combination of these. Study and practice designs that appeal to you. Will your quilts look fabulous right off the bat? If so, you would be the first quilter in history for whom that would be the case. In fact, you need to be willing to do a poor to mediocre job of it for a while. When your mama first held you up on your feet, you did not shake off her hands and stride off purposefully on your own. When she let go, you fell on your butt. If you want to claim your entire quilt as your own, you have to be willing to fall on your butt quite a bit first.

I cannot draw to save my life. I can make recognizable geometric renderings with the aid of graph paper and ruler, but stick-figures were the height of my pre-quilting artistic abilities. Much to my surprise, practice, practice, and yet more practice (with both pencil and needle) has allowed me to reach a level of quilting competence of which this drawer-of-stick-figures only dreamed. Practice, as well as a certain willingness to fall on my butt, has allowed me to overcome my natural inabilities. For those of you without my inherent clumsiness of artistic expression, the learning curve should be less long and difficult.

Not only will <u>lots</u> of practice improve your skills, a large <u>variety</u> of practice will improve your menu of choices when you are trying to figure out how to "quilt as desired". Learn from others — books, videos, classes, quilt shows, friends — but develop your own style and preferences. Most importantly, remember that it is what YOU desire that matters here.




