President's Challenge Pattern

A View Through My Window


2023 President's Challenge Finished Size: 18"x30"


Pattern Notes:

All pieces listed below are unfinished.

Use a ¼" seam allowance.

Fabric: Kona Jet Black #114





Patch Count

Cutting Instructions:

While supplies last, the guild is providing a 5" piece of 60" wide Kona Jet Black. (These instructions are based on a 60" WOF)

From the 5" piece provided, subcut into 2 - 2 %" strips.

Subcut 1 of the 2 ½" strips into

 $2-26 \frac{1}{2}$ " strips (Piece B)

Subcut 1 of the 2 ½" strips into

2 – 18 ½" strip (Piece A) be sure to leave a strip

that will yield one piece to be 14 1/2" long

1 - 14 ½" strip

Trim the 14 ½" x 2 ½" strip to 14 ½" x 1 ½" (Piece D - for center sashing of widow)

The 2 inside sections of the window (the top and bottom of the window) will equal 14 %" W x 13" H (Piece C).

Assembly:

- 1. After completing Pieces C (the top and bottom of the view in/out of your window), connect/join them by sewing Piece D between them. Press seam allowances towards the black fabric.
- 2. Add Pieces B (1 to each of the right and left sides) as a Left and Right Border/window frame. Press seam allowances towards the black fabric.
- 3. Add Pieces A (1 to the top and 1 to the bottom) as the top and bottom border/window frame. Press seam allowances towards the black fabric.
- 4. Finish the quilt either by binding the quilt with Kona Jet Black Fabric or by facing the quilt. The quilt must also have a sleeve and label following the specifications set by the 2023 Quilt Show Rules.

(**NOTE:** For display purposes, the Kona Jet Black fabric must be the final element at all outside edges of the quilt.)

A View Through My Window - President's Challenge 2023

"A short story is what you see when you look out of the window." -Mavis Gallant

This year, I challenge our quilt guild members to create a window scene either looking in or out of a window. All the windows will have the same frame and measure 18"x30". A piece of Kona Jet Black fabric, which was donated by Bernina World of Sewing, will be provided as well as a pattern for the window frame. All styles of quilting are welcomed, and the goal is to hang them at the 2023 Capital Quilters Guild Quilt Show as if you are looking into or out of an apartment building. Please join me in creating what is sure to be a beautiful installation.

The Rules....

- 1. The finished quilt must measure 18" wide by 30" long.
- 2. While supplies last, each member will be provided a piece of Kona Jet Black fabric which should be used as the window frame. Additional Kona Jet Black fabric can be purchased at your local quilt shop for windowpane dividers/mullions/grilles/muntins.
- 3. The quilt must be finished with a binding which should be the same fabric as the window frame (Kona Jet Black) or by finishing your edges by adding facing to the quilt (ie. using a pillowcase method.) Please note that to be eligible for judging, quilting must be seen on the back of the quilt. Additional fabric for the binding can be purchased at your local quilt shop.
- 4. All quilts must satisfy all requirements as set forth by the 2023 Quilt Show Rules and must have a sleeve following those specifications.
- 5. Quilts will be due by the 2023 Capital Quilters Quilt Show Entry Deadline. Exact due dates will be published once the quilt show committee announces them. Please know that having your project judged is OPTIONAL. Please feel free participate within the category as a non-judged quilt. However, all non-judged quilts must be registered by the quilt show entry deadline and submitted by preview day.

6. Participation is for 2022-2023 Capital Quilt Guild Members only.

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Spring 2023 Workshops

Kelly Ashton, April 21 & 22 - \$55 members and \$75 non-members

As a self-described "pragmatic quilt-maker", Kelly Ashton approaches quilt design and construction with a knowledge of and appreciation for the theoretical while searching for and developing skills and short-cuts that are practical. Kelly's passion for patchwork covers a dichotomy between "microwave quilts" (quilts that are simple in design and quick to piece) to "crock-pot quilts" (quilts that are more intricate and complex in their construction), and she happily moves back and forth betwixt the two....and everything in-between! Kelly is the author of Hexagons, Diamonds, Triangles, and More: Skill-Building Techniques for 60-Degree Patch-



work, and her obsession with 60-degree patchwork continues. In addition to designing quilts, Kelly especially loves to teach and talk about quilts. Her motto is "Have quilts. Will travel."

Kelly is a Bernina Ambassador and some of her classes can also be found on the Craftsy website (https://www.craftsy.com). Kelly resides in Overland Park, KS, USA with her husband, Jeff Seib. For more information, please check her website (kellyquilter.com. In addition to quilty things, Kelly owns and operates The Creative Place, a retreat for quilters and other artists located in Spring Hill, KS.

On Friday, April 21 Kelly will be teaching Tumbling Blocks which is a wonderful study in color and value, in addition to being the perfect learning ground for set-in seams! The kit fee is \$20 and includes templates. Skill level – confident beginner and beyond.



On Saturday, April 22 Kelly will be teaching Painted Mountains a beautiful project that explores color, proportion, and an unusual setting with no Y seams. The kit fee is \$25 and includes templates required for the pattern. Skill level – confident beginner and beyond.



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Sharon Huffstetler, Singer Featherweights May 19 & 20 9:00am -3:30pm - \$55 members and \$75 non-members

Sharon is the owner of Vintage Reflections, www.vintagereflections.net in Camden SC. She started her business when she realized her love for vintage and antique machines was more than one woman could ever collect and use on her own. 




Alabama State Block

Cutting Requirements:

Fabric 1: (Lightest colored fabric)

- A. Two 9 x 1 ½ inch rectangles
- B. Four 5 ½ x 1 ½ inch rectangles



Fabric 2: (Medium colored fabric)

C. Four $5 \% \times 1 \%$ inch rectangles D. Four $3 \% \times 1 \%$ inch rectangles

Fabric 3: (Crimson fabric)

- E. Two 9 x 1 ½ inch rectangles
- F. Five 1 ½ inch squares

Notes

This block is 9 1/2 inches unfinished.

When cutting all fabrics, cut from the bottom row up.

Directions have the seams pressed so that they can be nested when seamed together. When stitching sections together, If the seams are not facing opposite directions, repress one seam so that they can be nested.

Step 1: Combine Strips

Select strips A and strips E, as shown in photo 1.

Stitch one strip A to one strip E, right sides together, along one long side. Press toward the crimson. Repeat with the other strip A and strip E. See photo 2.

Cut the strips into 1½ inch pieces, as shown in photo 3. Then pair two of the pieces together, alternating the crimson and light squares, and stitch together. Press seams to one side. See photo 4. Repeat until you have five squares. You will have two individual strips left over. Using one of these strips, and one of the F pieces, attach the F piece to the end of the strip next to the light fabric, to form a set of three alternating squares. This is used for the center nine patch, and is placed vertically as shown in photo 5 below.









Step 2: Layout

Now that the photo 4 squares are completed, lay out your pieces as shown in photo 5, below. The extra photo 3 piece and the photo 3 piece with the extra crimson square are arranged in the center below and to the right of the center four-patch. Stitch each of the B and C pieces together along a long side. Press toward the medium colored fabric.

Attach an F square to either end of each of the vertical D rectangles. Press toward the crimson fabric.

Attach the remaining A/E piece from photo 3 to the four-patch, alternating colors and nesting the seams. Stitch, and press the seam toward the four-patch. See photo 6.

To complete the center 9-patch, attach the single strip of three squares to the double strip of three squares. Nest the seams. Stitch, and press the seam to one side. See photo 6.

Attach F/D/F strips to the light colored B strips that are attached to the C strips. Press toward the light B fabric strips. Attach the remaining D pieces to the top and bottom of the nine-patch. Press seams toward the nine-patch. See photo 8.

Step 3: Complete Block

Attach the two side pieces to the center nine patch piece. Stitch and press toward the side pieces. See photo 9. Attach the top row to the center row, nesting the seams. Stitch, and press toward the top piece.

Attach the bottom row to the center row, nesting the seams. Stitch, and press toward the bottom piece.

One Quilter's Experience

<u>Standard Disclaimer:</u> I do not hold myself out as an expert. I know that many of you know so much more than I do. I share my experience in the hope of helping newer quilters as well as to stimulate conversation among more experienced quilters. I welcome feedback and differing views, as we are all on this journey together and can only benefit from hearing each other. (If you are reading this in the newsletter, please weigh in on Facebook.)

Entering a Quilt Show (specifically, ours)

<u>Unique-to-this-article Disclaimer:</u> This article is an edited and updated version of one that appeared in our newsletter prior to our 2018 Quilt Show. Whether or not you read it back then, please do so now. My goal is the same now as it was then: I am hoping to persuade you to enter your quilt(s) in our Guild Show!

The Houston show is a genuine wonder.

The Paducah show is a national treasure.

These are the places where the very best of those who practice our craft display their greatest mastery. Wherever you may fall on the quilting-as-craft versus quilting-as-art spectrum, here art is unquestionably being displayed. These shows, as well as a few others, give us an awareness of how far we can go; they act as yearly reminders of the excellence to which we can aspire.

Our own Guild's annual quilt show, coming up this March, is different in nature. It isn't Houston. It isn't Paducah. In a way, it is something even better. It is US — our opportunity to show who we are — to shine — to share who we are and what we do — with each other, with other quilters, and with the general public. That is not to say that national-show-quality quilts are not being created in our Guild. They most certainly are! These are the most awe- inspiring part of who we are; but it is by no means the totality of who we are. We are a diverse community of quilters with a broad range of interests and skills.

It shall be the purpose and goal of the Guild to promote and perpetuate the Art of quilting. The work of the Guild is designed to educate all persons interested in preserving, continuing, and advancing this Art. The Guild shall encourage a high standard of design and technique in all forms of quilting and shall promote the Art of quilting by teaching and sponsoring exhibits. The Guild shall encourage the respect of all copyright laws.

One Quilters Experience—Cont.

Our Guild mission statement tells us our purpose. It is also the purpose of the quilt show. It is to promote and perpetuate the art of quilting. One of the best ways we accomplish this purpose is to educate the public. We do this not by showing only those museum-quality quilts made by a few, but by presenting to the world the wide variety of quilts that we make -- showing the full richness of who we are, beginner quilters and experts alike.

Every quilt tells a story. Look through your quilts made since 2018 and find one (or more) that tells a story — a story about challenges overcome; about an exciting creative opportunity; about a special gift of love and caring; about a new technique discovered; about memories preserved; about a quilt that makes you proud, even if you know it will never hang on the hallowed walls of The National Quilt Museum. Find a quilt that tells a story and share that story with everyone by entering it into <u>our</u> quilt show. You will do yourself proud and you will do the Guild proud.

Why am I going on about this? It is time to start giving some thought to what you will be submitting for our quilt show. And this <u>is</u> OUR Guild show – an opportunity to showcase the variety and the talent of our entire group for the community. We all have quilts that make us proud, even if they are not perfect. Frankly, I have yet to (and expect I may never) make a perfect quilt. But I am happy to show what I have made and I have always been honored to have my quilts hang in the same room with the many creative, varied, and beautiful quilts made by members of this Guild.

Registration for the Capital Quilters Guild 2023 Quilt Show starts the beginning of December and runs to the end of January or until we reach our capacity for the show. Make sure you are a part of it.
