Quilts in Bloom or Art in Quilts

The Capital Quilter's Guild quilt show is the same weekend as the NC Museum of Art's annual Art in Bloom. If you have never been, it is a fundraiser where they have florists create arrangements inspired by a piece of art in the museum. The flower arrangement is displayed with the inspiration piece.

For the President's Challenge, members can approach their design(s) in one of two different ways:

1 - **Quilt in Bloom** - a quilt inspired by flowers/gardens Or...

2 - **Art in Quilt** - a quilt inspired by a piece of artwork (a copy of the inspiration piece should be hung with the quilt).

September Workshops

Susan Brubaker Knapp, September 21, 22 & 23 9:00am-3:30pm, \$55 members and \$75 non-members

Susan teaches nationally and internationally, hosts "Quilting Arts TV,": co-hosts the "Quilting Arts Podcast," and has produced numerous patterns, authored two books and produced five video workshops. She loves traditional hand quilting and needleturn appliqué, but has embraced innovative coaching techniques and started making art quilts in 2005. Her work is in private and public collections, including the International Quilt Museum (Lincoln, NE) and International Quilt Festival Collection (Houston, TX). Her work will be exhibited at Quilt National in 2023.





On Friday, September 22, Susan will teach Needleturn Appliqué. Learn the fine art of needle

turn appliqué step by step. If you've never done needle turn appliqué and are intimidated and afraid to try, this workshop is for you. Using Susan's "Spring Valentine" pattern, which has all the shapes and techniques beginner appliqués need to learn, we will cover marking and pinning, concave curves and points, convex curves and points, reverse appliqué, bias stems, small and medium circles, straight lines, making a positioning overlay, and making pattern templates.

Experience level—Beginner to Intermediate

On Thursday, September 21 (registration open), and Saturday, September 23 (registration full/ waitlist), Susan will teach Wholecloth Painting Botanicals. Students will learn the basics of creating whole cloth painted quilts based on photos. Students can choose from the four projects shown here and will work from Susan's line drawings and photos to recreate the image using acrylic textile paints. Afraid to try this technique? Don't be! Susan's students get great results. The workshop will over selecting the right photos for great results, which paints and fabrics to use and why, how to transfer your design to fabric, painting and blending techniques, and guilting considerations. Note: No machine work. The Kit Fee is \$25 and includes fabric, pattern, paint and brushes. Experience level-All. Kit Fee is \$25 and includes fabric, pattern, paint and brushes.

One Quilter's Experience

I do not hold myself out as an expert. I know that many of you know so much more than I do. I share my experience in the hope of helping newer quilters as well as to stimulate conversation among more experienced quilters. I welcome feedback and differing views, as we are all on this journey together and can only benefit from hearing each other. (If you are reading this in the newsletter, please weigh in on Facebook.)

Free-Motion Quilting 101

Do it! Quilt your own quilts! It's fun! It's beautiful! You fully own all aspects of the quilt! Don't share the glory of your creation with a long-armer! Start with your walking foot and then go to town with free-motion quilting!

Okay, yes, I am obnoxiously bossy, but I'm also not wrong. Even if you still want to send off your larger quilts to be long-armed, consider quilting those smaller quilts we make for laps and for little people. Here are my own tips for the mechanics of free-motion quilting:

In my experience, successful free-motion quilting is all about reducing the friction between the quilt and the table surface and increasing the friction between your hands and the quilt. There are multiple ways to do both of these:

1. Use silicone spray on your tabletop. Spray. Let sit a bit. Wipe with paper towel. You will need to reapply periodically.

2. Use a slider. There are items specifically marketed as quilting sliders, but I bought this larger surface that will require you to secure it:

Flexible Flyer 611 Flying Carpet Lightweight Roll Up Snow Sled Portable Rolling Snow Slider, Blue <u>https://a.co/d/itdOK7P</u>

3. Keep as much of your quilt as possible on the same level as your machine bed. An expanded table or a set-in table for your machine are good solutions. And keep re-adjusting the bulk of your quilt to keep it from falling off the edge of your surface and weight/gravity pulling on your quilt.

4. Wear high-friction gloves. I use machingers (because they are lightweight) but have friends who like garden gloves with friction bumps.

5. Use a hoop glider like this: Gypsy Quilter Fabulous Fabric Glide

I strongly recommend that you watch some YouTube videos – my own recommendation would be those of Angela Walters (Quilting is my Therapy) and Patsy Thompson, but really the more you watch, the more likely you will find the instructors who will inspire you. Practice by doodling with pencil and scrap paper. Practice over and over. Make yourself a big pile of practice sandwiches –muslin and batting. Then practice, practice on them. It takes hours and hours to develop hand-eye coordination and muscle-memory, but it is <u>so</u> worth it! It also takes time to develop the ease-of-use that allows your machine to become an extension of yourself. Think of the difference between when you first started learning to drive (having to consciously think of every single aspect of driving) and how you drive after many decades of experience. My early quilting projects look like they were done by the left hand of a right-handed, near-sighted kindergartener in the midst of throwing a tantrum (i.e., not smooth). After many hours working on practice sandwiches, I started with charity quilts. I got better . . . slowly.

Regardless of the size of your quilt or your throat space, you will have to deal with bulk. I do not roll my quilts. I tried that, securing it with bicycle clips, when I first got started, but I found that attempting to maneuver a long, rigid tube smoothly is much more difficult than just "puddling" the quilt around the needle space. You will have to re-adjust the bulk frequently to ensure that you can move smoothly without resistance (as mentioned above).

Speaking of which, it matters where you are in your design when you stop to move your hands and to adjust your quilt-bulk. Do not stop mid-curve. It is almost impossible to restart and continue smoothly. Stop at the beginning/end of an arc or curve. For example, if you are making a feather, stop at the spine. If you are quilting a design where lines cross, you can stop at the point where they cross. This will make any lack-of-smoothness less visible.

I have heard advice that one should practice quilting by writing in cursive. This is generally good advice. Cursive writing has a fascinating mix of shapes – smooth curves, back-tracking, sharp angles. I

did this a bit, but my handwriting is rather full of stops and starts, so this does not work as well for me as it might for others. I just scrounged design books, found quilting designs that I liked, and practiced with them. That meant I often practiced on the more difficult designs, because (apparently) I have a streak of masochism. My free-motion work really took off after a Guild workshop with Patsy Thompson. I fell madly in love with feathers in all their variety and forms. I find the work of so many quilters inspirational and hope to one day be even fractionally as good as they are. My friends will tell you that my number one question when someone shows me a finished top is "How are you thinking of quilting it?"

2023 Holiday Block Party

What is your favorite block? Do you love a Log Cabin? Does a block made from flying geese get your creative juices flowing? Do you delight in beautiful appliqué? Have you always enjoyed the movement of a drunkard's path? Are you mad for the precision that paper piecing gives pointy blocks?

The Holiday Block committee (Katie Mistele and Barbara Johnson) is asking for individuals, bees, and groups of friends to sponsor a Holiday Block this year.

Here is how the program works:

- Sponsors commit to participate by September 15th. Sponsors select a block (or blocks) to make a quilt top and submit an application to have the block approved.
- After approval, sponsors kit the instructions and the fabrics for the blocks to sell at the October and November Guild meetings.
- Guild members will purchase the kits and return their finished blocks to the sponsors at the December Guild meeting.
- Sponsors will draw a winner for each quilt and the winner gets all of the finished blocks as well as any unsold kits. Participants get to keep the instructions.

The best part is when the winners bring finished quilts back to show the Guild!

Q - Do the blocks have to be Holiday themed?

A – They do not. Choose any design and any colors you want. The blocks are turned in and awarded to the winner at our December Holiday Social, hence the name. That being said, Holiday designs are popular.

Q – Are the costs of making the kits covered?

A – You may submit a reimbursement form (supplied on request) for a maximum of \$25. Many groups and individuals choose to donate some or all of the fabric required to make the kits, but you are certainly not required to do so.

Q – What techniques are appropriate for Holiday Blocks?

A – All techniques and skill levels are welcome. Generally, relatively simple designs with appealing colors/fabrics are popular. In the past, we have had redwork, simple piecing, paper piecing, appliqué or even some combination of the above.

Q – How many blocks per sponsored design?

A – Typically, between 16 to 25 kits. However, a kit may contain one or two blocks.

Q – How many sponsored designs will be sold?

A – We try for 10 to 12 different designs, preferably representing a wide variety of techniques and difficulty levels.

Q – If I want to sponsor a block, can I get started right away?

A – Do not spend any money for which you will want to be reimbursed until your design is approved. First you must submit an application with a color image of the block design. (A clear, but simple drawing will do.) This is to prevent duplicate (or near duplicate) blocks.

Please consider sponsoring a Holiday Block. Contact Katie Mistele or Barbara Johnson if you want to sponsor a block or if you have any further questions.
